SMERU's research note outlines the challenges faced by Kabupaten Ketapang in achieving inclusive economic development and suggests steps that the local government can undertake without overly burdening its regional budget (APBD). Discussion Forum on Enhancing the Quality of Primary Education (FOKUS)

National and international assessments indicate that the foundational skills (literacy and numeracy) of Indonesian students have stagnated over the past two decades. The government has made various efforts to address this issue, including collaborating with multiple non-governmental organizations and philanthropies such as SMERU and the Tanoto Foundation.

To support these efforts, the Tanoto Foundation and SMERU, under the guidance of the Ministry of Education, Culture, Research, and Technology, organized the Discussion Forum on Enhancing the Quality of Primary Education (FOKUS) on 5 December. SMERU's senior researcher, Asri Yusrina, was a speaker and presented findings from several of SMERU's research on education, particularly those related to teacher competence. SMERU Activities



First Secretary of the Information and Cultural Division, Embassy of Japan in Indonesia, Yuriko Kawakubo, visited the SMERU office on Wednesday, 29 November. The First Secretary had a discussion with several SMERU researchers on child labor in Indonesia, including one concerning the children's education levels. SMERU researchers presented the findings of the Institute's child labor studies, especially regarding the factors that underlie children's decision to work and the factors that influence whether or not they continue to attend school.



On 30 November, representatives from the ASEAN+3 Macroeconomic Research Office (AMRO) visited SMERU, where researchers shared insights from their previous studies. The discussion included the Indonesian elderly population and its contrasts with other countries, particularly China, Japan, and Singapore, which also face similar challenges, and other issues. SMERU is one of the 21 think tanks in the ASEAN region that have joined the ASEAN+3 Finance Think-tank Network established by AMRO.



As 2023 draws to a close, SMERU continued its tradition of holding the Annual Strategic Meeting on 7–8 December. During this meeting, all employees, from management to section level, sat together to discuss the Institute's short-term strategy and draft the 2024 work plan. Each section was also encouraged to propose breakthroughs in its work plan to support the Institute's financial sustainability. This annual meeting is also an opportunity for all employees to reconnect in person after the remote working system was implemented in 2020.

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
