Revisiting Youth Development Index

The Indonesian Government used the Youth Development Index (YDI) in the 2020–2024 National Medium-Term Development Plan (RPJMN) to assess the success of youth development. The YDI is expected to be utilized as a tool for policymakers, specifically for youth development policies in the upcoming 2025–2029 RPJMN. SMERU, supported by UNFPA and Bappenas, revisits and updates the YDI to strengthen the Index's role in underlying policy, programs, and directions for youth-related issues in Indonesia over the next five years, including in crafting and implementing effective youth-centric initiatives. SMERU Activities



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SMERU's researcher, Aisyah Putri Mayangsari, was a speaker in a webinar titled "Advancing Inclusion: Analysis of the Landscape of Children with Disabilities in Indonesia" on 21 December 2023. The webinar presented the analysis of the landscape of children with disabilities by UNICEF and Bappenas to journalists and the general public. The hope is that this analysis will contribute to promoting the implementation of policies that uphold the rights of children with disabilities in Indonesia. The webinar also emphasized the significance of collecting and analyzing data in advocating for the rights of children with disabilities.



SMERU welcomed a visit from Indonesian Education Watch (IEW), a non-profit organization in the field of education initiated by young teachers who graduated from Jakarta State University, on 11 January. During the visit, the IEW team discussed SMERU's research on education, acknowledging their relevance to real-world issues. The IEW team also expressed a desire to collaborate with SMERU in the future for conducting studies and hosting discussions on educational matters.



Representatives from the United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO) met with SMERU's researchers on 11 January to gain insights into Indonesia's economic development journey towards achieving inclusive and sustainable industrial development (ISID). UNIDO is a specialized agency of the United Nations that assists countries in economic and industrial development. During the meeting, SMERU presented its work and research relevant to inclusive and sustainable economic development.



On 11 January, SMERU met with the SMI Institute, an entity focused on providing solutions to address regional economic challenges through research and fellowship capacity building and training, and knowledge-sharing with local governments in Indonesia. The hope is that the SMI Institute will increase the capacity of local governments in providing the necessary access according to the characteristics of each region. The Head of SMI Institute, I Kadek Dian Sutrisna Artha, said that collaboration with diverse stakeholders is required to gain a comprehensive understanding of the social, economic, and political conditions in different regions. SMERU and SMI Institute formalized their collaboration through the signing of a memorandum of understanding, with a particular emphasis on joint efforts to advance inclusive development of infrastructure and local government capacity.



Athia Yumna, the deputy director of research and outreach at SMERU, was invited to attend the Global Conclave on 'Advancing Human Development in the Global South' on 11–13 January in New Delhi, India. This international conference was organized by the Research and Information System for Developing Countries and the Institute for Human Development, in collaboration with NITI Aayog, a think tank of the Government of India. During the conference, Athia served as one of the panelists presenting a session titled "Climate Change, Livelihoods, and Social Protection: Policy Lessons and Gaps".

Asri presented one finding from the RISE Programme in Indonesia research, which highlights that teachers with excellent competence have an impact on transforming children with low learning abilities through differentiated teaching. She also said that the competency level of Indonesian teachers varies, emphasizing the need for differentiated capacity-building for teachers, especially those in service, based on each teacher's specific needs.
