Evaluation of Stunting Interventions in Indonesia: Impacts at the Kabupaten/Kota Level



The Indonesian government has been actively implementing various programs and policies to reduce stunting rates, focusing on nutrition-specific and sensitive interventions. Since 2018, the Tanoto Foundation has been a strategic partner in supporting these government efforts. This support has taken various forms, including building the capacity of human resources at all levels of government, raising public awareness and knowledge about stunting prevention, and conducting research relevant to stunting issues. SMERU undertakes research to understand how Tanoto Foundation's programs have been implemented and their impact on enhancing local government capacity in efforts to reduce stunting at the *kabupaten*/city level. Towards Inclusive Energy Transition in Indonesia: Simulating the Impact of Energy Sector Decarbonization on the Welfare of Vulnerable Groups

This white paper presents a simulation of the impact of energy transition on vulnerable groups. Using the Global Change Assessment Model and the Almost Ideal Demand System Model, the study found that accelerating the achievement of net-zero emissions could potentially increase poverty and inequality, especially for vulnerable groups. Life in a Time of Food Price Volatility: Evidence from Three Villages in Indonesia—Findings of Years 1 and 2

Published in 2018, this research report remains relevant today. It examined the impact of volatile prices for food, fuel, and other basic necessities on the welfare of poor and vulnerable communities in Indonesia. Using case studies from three locations, the study identified how these communities coped with price volatility between 2011 and 2013 and the resulting effects on their food consumption patterns. SMERU hosted an public seminar on 7 January, featuring Zulfan Tadjoeddin, an associate professor in development studies at Western Sydney University. Zulfan discussed an overview of his latest book, *Structural Transformation as Development: Path Dependence and Geopolitics*, co-authored with Anis Chowdhury and Yogi Vidyattama. The book examines the development challenges and opportunities faced by developing countries in Asia, Africa, and the Pacific, considering their unique economic and geopolitical contexts.

On 22 January, SMERU welcomed a delegation from Asia School of Business (ASB), a graduate business school based in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. ASB has four research centers focusing on sustainable small-owners; technology, strategy, and sustainability; ASEAN studies; and central banking.
