This *Kompas* article highlights the paradox of unemployment in Indonesia: the open unemployment rate has declined, yet the number of unemployed has increased by over 80,000. Beneath these figures lies a deeper issue—low job quality. Many workers remain trapped in the informal sector, earning low wages with minimal productivity. A SMERU study cited in the article also underscores the widening gap between formal workers whose wages continue to rise and informal workers whose incomes remain stagnant. #### **Activities**



On 7 September in Jakarta, SMERU researcher Rezanti Putri Pramana joined the Teras Belajar public discussion as one of the speakers. With the theme "Teacher Leadership for Equitable Education Quality", the event highlighted the experiences of education stakeholders in addressing equity challenges through stronger teacher leadership. Organized by Pemimpin.id in partnership with the Consortium of Community for Education Advocacy in Indonesia (KMPPI), the discussion was part of a broader roadshow on the National Education System Bill (RUU Sisdiknas).



On 24 September in Bogor, Ananta Fund, a special program of the KEHATI
Foundation that manages an endowment fund to support the sustainability of Indonesian civil society organizations (CSOs), held the Partner Networking and Knowledge Sharing Forum. The event brought together grantees to connect, share experiences and good practices, strengthen networks, and formulate joint strategies for greater impact. SMERU was represented by Senior Researcher Heni Kurniasih, who presented findings from a study on strengthening Indonesian CSOs.



On 22 September, KMPPI presented its recommendations on the National Education System Bill (RUU Sisdiknas) in a Public Hearing with Commission X of the Indonesian Parliament at Nusantara I Building, Jakarta. The proposals included redefining Compulsory Education from 9 to 13 years, reintegrating out-of-school children into education services, and introducing regulations on preventing and addressing violence to ensure safe, inclusive, and tolerant schools. SMERU, as a member and secretariat of KMPPI in 2025, was represented by Senior Researcher Ulfah Alifia.
