Policy	Lessons learned from existing studies
 <p>Improving access to internet and devices</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Women continue to suffer from unaffordability, lack of connectivity, and lack of access to a device
 <p>Reducing the gap in digital literacy and skills</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Internet adoption is not always accompanied by deep and productive use of digital technologies due to lack of digital literacy and skills
 <p>Equal distribution of unpaid care work (UCW)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Changing social norms on how men and women share UCW is considered necessary such that women may utilize internet to access gainful employment
 <p>Law enforcement addressing online violence against women</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Online and ICT-facilitated violence against women may impact women's online presence and the maximum benefit they may reap from digitalization

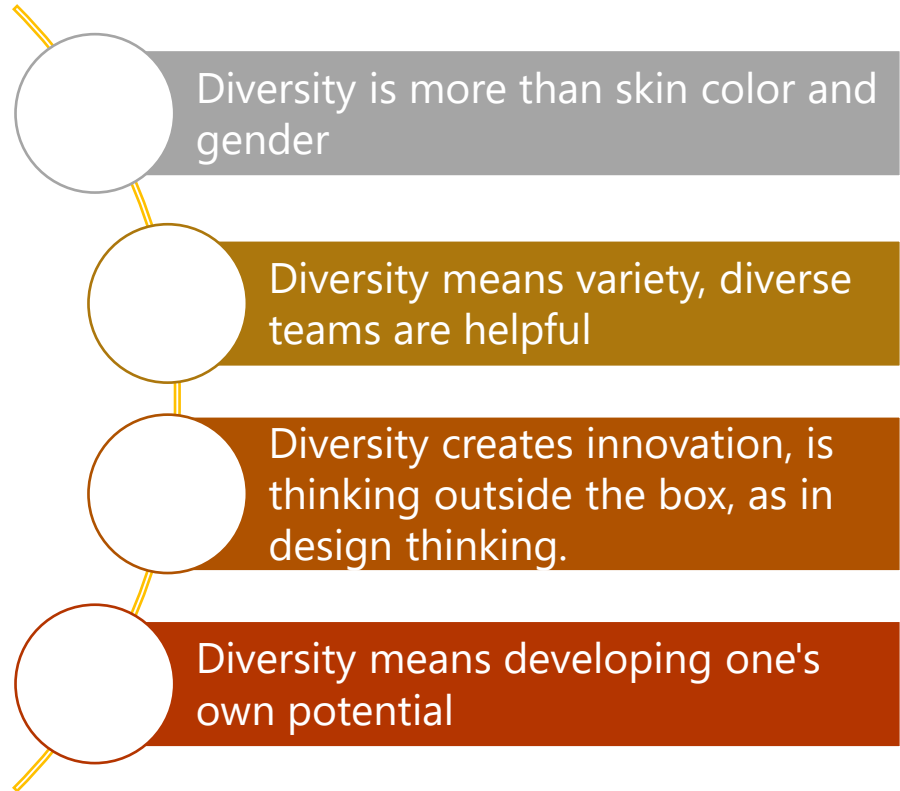
