How to improve digital dividend for women?

Policy	Lessons learned from existing studies
Improving access to internet and devices	• Women continue to suffer from unaffordability, lack of connectivity, and lack of access to a device
Reducing the gap in digital literacy and skills	 Internet adoption is not always accompanied by deep and productive use of digital technologies due to lack of digital literacy and skills
Equal distribution of unpaid care work (UCW)	Changing social norms on how men and women share UCW is considered necessary such that women may utilize internet to access gainful employment
Law enforcement addressing online violence against women	Online and ICT-facilitated violence against women may impact women's online presence and the maximum benefit they may reap from digitalization
