The COVID-19 pandemic posed unprecedented challenges to health systems worldwide. The Government of Indonesia received US\$1 billion in emergency loans from the World Bank, AIIB, KfW, and DFAT during the pandemic. The loan was used for, among others, to improve hospital and health system readiness for COVID-19 response and facilitate effective public risk communication. SMERU researchers met and talked with the Secretary General of the Ministry of Labor, Anwar Sanusi, and the Head of the Center for Development of Labor Policy, Agency for Employment Planning and Development, Muhyiddin. The talk preceded the ministerial lecture held by the Ministry of Labor and Brawijaya University on 14 March 2023. A SMERU researcher, Palmira Permata Bachtiar, was a speaker in the lecture.
